

THIS ELECTION, MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD

WHY SHOULD I VOTE?

- This election will decide who will be our Prime Minister. The government we elect will make policies about housing, employment, transportation, and childcare that will impact your life.
- Your vote counts! When you vote, the candidate who best represents your values has a greater chance of winning.

CAN I VOTE?

You can vote in the federal election if:

- You are a Canadian Citizen
- You are at least 18 years of age on election day

DO I NEED TO REGISTER TO VOTE?

You do not need to register in advance to vote! You can register when you arrive to vote.

The benefit of registering before election day is that it will be a bit quicker to vote. If you received a Voter Information Card, you are already registered.

If you have not received a Voter Information Card, you can register to vote at www.elections.ca before October 15, 6pm.

WHEN AND WHERE DO I VOTE?

You can vote between October 11 – 14, or on Election Day October 21, 2019.

You will vote at the polling station listed on your Voter Information Card. If you lost your card, or did not receive one, you can visit www.elections.ca or call Elections Canada at **1-800-463-6868** to find out your polling station address.

Your employer is required to grant you 3 paid hours off work to vote, if you do not have time to vote outside of your working hours.

WHAT DO I NEED TO BRING WITH ME TO VOTE?

Driver's license or other card issued by the federal, provincial or municipal government with your photo, name and current address.	You can show 2 documents with your name on it. At least 1 of the documents must include your current address (for example: health card + bank statement; utility bill + pay stub).	If you do not have any documents proving your address, you can still vote! You will need to declare your current address and bring someone to vouch for you. The person who vouches for you must be able to prove their identity and address.

If you do not have a permanent address, you can ask your shelter or social service agency for a Letter of Confirmation of Residence.
